Mini Art Lesson:

Napoleon Leading the Army over the Alps by Kehinde Wiley

Taking inspiration from Kehinde Wiley's <u>Napoleon</u> <u>Leading the Army over the Alps</u> (2005), we'll create powerful poses with your kids ages 2–6 and draw expressive self-portraits for kids ages 7 and up. Feel free to adapt the activities in a way that best suits your family!

FOR AGES 2–6: LET'S PLAY

Step 1: Look at Wiley's artwork with your child and then copy the pose of the figure in the painting. Model it for your child and have them pose with you!

Step 2: Mix and match your outfit with items from your closet! Here's A.R.T. Guide Elizabeth Crowell responding to the challenge. (A)

Step 3: How did you feel making that pose? Write these words down on a piece of paper. Do you think this is how the person in Wiley's painting feels, too?

Step 4: Now, set a timer for 10 seconds. Make the same pose again, this time acting out the words you wrote down.

Step 5: Repeat above, but add lots of movement to get those wiggles out!

Step 1: Think of a symbol that represents you. Grab a sheet of paper and draw it as a patterned background. Be sure to fill the whole piece of paper! (A)

Step 2: On a separate sheet, draw a picture of yourself in a powerful pose. Then, cut out your self-portrait and glue it onto the patterned paper. (B)

Step 3: From a magazine (or with a printer), cut out different images that represent you. Glue these cutouts along the edge of your paper to create a frame. Check out Wiley's gold frame for inspiration! (C)
