Anger Management, a Pop-Up Shop Conceived and Organized by Marilyn Minter and Andrianna Campbell, Offers Objects of Hope, Resistance, and Protest for a Limited Time Only at the Brooklyn Museum

Features objects by artists Jenny Holzer, Barbara Kruger, Glenn Ligon, Robert Longo, Faith Ringgold, and many more

Anger Management, a pop-up shop featuring limited edition objects with themes of resistance, hope, and protest, opens at the Brooklyn Museum on September 28. The artist- and designer-made objects were selected by art historian Andrianna Campbell and artist Marilyn Minter and feature artists such as John Baldessari, Zoe Buckman, Jenny Holzer, Barbara Kruger, Glenn Ligon, Robert Longo, Daniel Joseph Martinez and Julie Mehretu (in collaboration), Mary Ping, Faith Ringgold, Laurie Simmons, and Hank Willis Thomas, among many others. Anger Management closes November 12, the Sunday following Election Day.

Anger Management includes more than 60 objects, including a selection of stickers, T-shirts, posters, temporary tattoos, pins, and mugs. The majority of products range between \$5 and \$30. Highlighted products include temporary tattoos and transparent window stickers featuring Marilyn Minter's RESIST FLAG; a T-shirt featuring Barbara Kruger's Untitled (Admit nothing|Blame everyone|Be bitter); a selection of stickers and postcards by Jenny Holzer; hand-painted Resistance underwear, by Laurie Simmons;

and a neon cross sculpture by Jonathon Horowitz. Also for sale is the same custom designed wallpaper by Rob Pruitt that decorates the interiors of *Anger Management*, as well as a Jeremyville box set, which includes a jumpsuit and a set of posters and stickers.

The artists will donate their portion of the proceeds to charities of their choosing, and the balance of the proceeds will support the Brooklyn Museum.

Andrianna Campbell and Marilyn Minter state, "We titled this pop-up shop *Anger Management* in order to highlight our response to, and our displeasure with, so many wrongs: the immigration ban; the attacks on the EPA; the continued violence against people of color, queer and gender-nonconforming individuals, and religious minorities; the intimidation tactics of white supremacists and a blossoming Neo-Nazi movement (when we lost more than 400,000 Americans fighting Nazis and fascism abroad); and the rescission of labor

rights and workers' benefits. As educated individuals, anger seems like an irrational response, but at this stage, it is the most rational response that we have."

"Artists are our societal mirror," says Chad Philips, Brooklyn Museum Director of Merchandising. "When Marilyn and Andrianna approached us, we knew we had to provide an outlet for these artists to express themselves at this time of social unrest."
