Celebrate the legacy of artist Nellie Mae Rowe with an exhibition tour led by her grandniece; a poetic tribute; a conversation about "self-taught," "outsider," and "folk" art; and a performance by Lonnie Holley. The program aims to invoke Rowe's ethos of hospitality by inviting visitors to look closely at her art and come together around conversation and live music.

The Brooklyn Symphony Orchestra performs the magical score of *La boutique* fantasque, a ballet set in an enchanted toy shop. The music was written by Italian

maestro Gioacchino Rossini and arranged by Ottorino Respighi. Then, violinist Kinga Augustyn joins as soloist for Tchaikovsky's iconic Violin Concerto in D Major. To conclude, the orchestra celebrates the life of one of its staunchest supporters, Dr. Redington Barrett, with a short piece.
