The Brooklyn Museum Acquires Work by Ed Clark at Frieze through The LIFEWTR Fund

The Brooklyn Museum has acquired *Untitled* (1978–80), a large-scale abstract painting by the American artist **Ed Clark**, which will join the Museum's permanent collection through the generous support of The LIFEWTR Fund at Frieze New York.

Born in 1926 in New Orleans, Ed Clark is an abstract painter who is considered one of the early innovators of the shaped canvas. The Museum's new acquisition is an early example of the artist's push-broom technique, which allowed him to move paint swiftly across the canvas in wide, bold strokes. The painting will be included in the Museum's upcoming presentation of *Soul of a Nation: Art in the Age of Black Power*, opening September 14, 2018.

The work was selected by a panel composed of the Brooklyn Museum's Shelby White and Leon Levy Director, **Anne Pasternak**; Deputy Director and Chief Curator, **Jennifer Chi**; and curators **Eugenie Tsai**, **Catherine Morris**, **Ashley James**, and **Carmen Hermo**. The fund is chaired and organized by **Olga Osminkina**, Vice President, Hydration & Innovation, Global Beverage Group, PepsiCo.

Anne Pasternak stated: "We're so grateful to Frieze and LIFEWTR for the continued partnership and opportunity to acquire this important work by Ed Clark from the late 1970s—the first work of the artist's to enter our collection. The acquisition further deepens our commitment to African American artists and we're thrilled to include the painting in our upcoming exhibition, *Soul of a Nation: Art in the Age of Black Power*, which will also include the work by Virginia Jaramillo that we added to our collection last year through the support of the fund."

LIFEWTR, a premium water brand committed to advancing and showcasing sources of creativity, contributed \$100,000 to support the Museum's acquisition of *Untitled*, purchased at Frieze New

York. The LIFEWTR Fund was launched last year, when it made possible the Museum's acquisition of *Untitled* (1971), by **Virginia Jaramillo**.
